
Methodology

- Three focus groups in early September 2015 in Bala Cynwyd, Pennsylvania (Philadelphia suburb) among parents, segmented by children's ages: 6 to 9, 10 to 13, and 14 to 17
- Online nationwide survey among 589 parents of children age
 6 to 17, conducted October 5 to 8, 2015
- In each component of the research, children of participating parents had to use the Internet and have access to technology devices.



Kids' adoption of mobile technology continues to rise.






When did (or will) children get their own mobile devices and social networking accounts?

Among parents' day-to-day worries about their children, technology use is a lower-tier (but still present) concern. Safety and privacy top the list.




Proportions saying the use of technology, including electronic devices, social media, and being online, have a positive effect on my child in the following areas:



Parents draw some distinctions between more beneficial and more harmful technologies.


How would you weigh the potential benefits and harms of your child having these?

How confident do you feel in your ability to keep track of and manage your child's use of technology, including electronic devices and being online?*





How much do you know about what your child does when (he/she) uses technology, including using electronic devices, using social medial, and being online?



How much do you know about what your child does when (he/she) is engaged with technology in these ways?







Who is teaching whom?

Who knows more about technology and online activities: you or your child?






I have learned something from my child about the features of this or how to use it:





One in three parents reports having used parental controls.

Have you ever used a tool, program, or app to assist you in limiting or monitoring your child's Internet usage? These are often called parental controls.



Parents who do not use parental controls in most cases simply do not see the need.

But many parents say they have done some things to manage or monitor their child's access to technology.

87% of parents say they have rules for their child's technology use, including the following:






Three in four parents have limited their child's access to technology as a consequence for their behavior.

But parents also admit to some missteps.

Proportions of parents* saying they have done each:

I posted or shared something online about 19% my child that he/she may find embarrassing in the future

My child was embarrassed by a picture or something I posted about him/her online

My child asked me to take down a picture 10% or something I posted about him/her

I posted or shared something negative or 7% critical about my child, such as disappointing grades or bad behavior

"I will look at things [on my phone] at a red light. I'm trying to even get away from that, not because I feel like I'm putting myself at risk, but because I know people are watching, like my son."


